our commitment to the environment and our community

Chevron Richmond is committed to continually improving our environmental performance and managing the potential impacts of our operations. We know our community has questions and we want you to feel as safe and comfortable as we do when we come to work every day.

We have committed to enhancing our flare controls and increasing community transparency by:

- Implementing improvements to the facility's flare monitoring and sampling systems and operator training programs.
- Supplementing our current community outreach by sharing additional information related to air quality and flaring activity on our website: richmond.chevron.com.

partnership environmental and community benefit agreement

The City of Richmond and Chevron Richmond agreed to an Environmental and Community Investment Agreement (ECIA), which provided \$90 million dollars to the Richmond community over ten years. The ECIA is related to the Richmond Refinery Modernization Project approved in 2014.



mce solar one

We are providing access to 49 acres of refinery land for the MCE Solar One project, which generates 22,000 MWh per year of renewable energy, enough to power 3,900 homes.



richmond promise

The program gives every Richmond high school graduate a \$1,500 college scholarship (renewable for up to four years) toward the pursuit of associate and bachelor degrees, as well as career technical education certifications. To date, more than 3,000 Richmond students have received Promise scholarships.



transportation fund for clean air grant match The City of Richmond leveraged

funding from the ECIA to earn a grant from the Bay Area Air Quality Management District. Through this grant, the City was able to focus on bicycle, pedestrian, and other transportation projects that help support the Richmond community by reducing motor vehicle emissions.



question & answer

What is Chevron Richmond doing to improve air quality and reduce emissions?

We live in a state that challenges us to meet the most stringent environmental regulations and Chevron is committed to meeting those challenges. It will take all of us to improve air quality in the Bay Area. From traffic to wildfires to industry to sources within our own homes, we will need to work together to tackle these complex challenges.

For our part, we are investing in our facility to reduce emissions and increase reliability. We have a comprehensive air monitoring system with hundreds of air quality monitors within the refinery, three fence line monitors, and three community monitoring stations. We are always developing new projects to make our operations more efficient and reduce emissions. Government policies that support permitting and investment will be crucial to moving these beneficial projects forward.

What actions does the refinery take when a flaring event occurs?

- A notification is sent to appropriate regulatory agencies, including Contra Costa County's Community Warning System, as soon as possible and typically within 15 minutes. You can sign up to receive applicable alerts at cwsalerts.com.
- The Chevron Fire Department conducts air monitoring with sensitive equipment from 10 locations within the refinery and the community to assess potential impacts on air quality.
- If the community needs to take action, we will post updates on our Chevron Richmond Facebook and Twitter accounts.
- Our employees work as quickly as possible to mitigate and stop the flaring. A thorough investigation is done and necessary actions are taken to help prevent similar events in the future.

el sol recognizes richmond's "filipino fathers"

Point Richmond's El Sol restaurant regularly hosts art in its dining area. For owner Josephine Orozco, the May exhibit "Filipino Fathers" had a special meaning.

Her father, Nicasio (Nick) Abida Calvan, emigrated from the Philippines to eventually work as a chief steward on ships from Standard Oil, a predecessor company to Chevron Richmond. In May, during Asian American Pacific American Heritage Month, Orozco helped organize an exhibit featuring vibrant banners detailing facets of the lives of 10 "Filipino fathers" including her father Nick showcasing their lives working for Standard Oil and living in Richmond.
